Acting Principal's Message



What a wonderful and busy fortnight we've had in OS1! In math's, we've been diving into place value across all year levels. Our Foundation and Year 1 students have been learning about the value of ten, using everyday objects to represent groups of ten and build larger numbers. Meanwhile, our Year 2s have been continuing their place value journey with repeated practice to strengthen their understanding.

In literacy, we've been exploring vowel digraphs, with a focus on oa and ow. Students have been reading, writing and spelling words with these sounds. Our F–1 learners have also been meeting new letter friends like Fifi Flamingo and Rosie Rabbit, which has been a fun way to connect with letters and sounds. As a whole class, we've been using The Very Hungry Caterpillar as a mentor text to learn about narrative structure. The students especially enjoyed bringing the story to life through dramatic play – I can't wait to see the narratives they create themselves!

We've also had some exciting experiences beyond the classroom. The students had a fantastic time in the kitchen, cooking up delicious mini quiches and a yummy lemon slice. On top of that, we learned about the DRS steps of first aid, and I was incredibly proud of how well everyone represented our school during the session.

It's been a joyful and productive fortnight – I'm so proud of this group and all their efforts.

It's been an exciting couple of weeks in ME1!

In maths, we've been exploring multiplication and division, focusing on different strategies to help us solve problems efficiently and with confidence. Students have enjoyed using hands-on materials, drawing arrays, and making connections between the two operations.

In literacy, we've been investigating the tricky spelling of the "long a" sound and have discovered that there are six different graphemes (spelling choices) that can represent this phoneme. It's been a great way to build our decoding and spelling skills.


We've also continued working on our narratives, using our mentor text The Fantastic Flying Books of Mr Morris Lessmore to guide our learning. We've been diving into the author's purpose, identifying the genre and intended audience, and exploring how images can add deeper meaning to a story. It's been wonderful to see students making thoughtful connections between words and visuals.

DID YOU KNOW?

Yackandandah truly shines in autumn, with streets and bush tracks transforming into a sea of red, gold and orange. This seasonal magic comes from deciduous trees like maples, oaks, elms and liquidambars, which shed their leaves each year to conserve energy through winter. As the days grow shorter and cooler, the green pigment (chlorophyll) in the leaves breaks down. This reveals the vibrant reds, yellows and purples that were there all along but hidden.

These colours aren't just beautiful. They're a great way to connect with nature. Taking a walk around Yackandandah in autumn is like stepping into a living artwork. Next time you're outside, see how many different leaf colours and shapes you can spot. Can you find a perfect red maple leaf? Or one with all the colours in one?

CYMHS and Schools Early Action (CASEA) Program

Your school has volunteered to take part in the CYMHS and Schools Early Action (CASEA) Program. CASEA is run in partnership between Child and Youth Mental Health Service (CYMHS) and local primary schools.

The CYMHS and Schools Early Action (CASEA) Program is an early intervention program for primary school students. It aims to help children develop their social and emotional skills; to support parents and/or care givers; and offers additional supports, learning and consultation to school staff. The CASEA team is made up of allied health professionals and is a part of the Child and Youth Mental Health Service (CYMHS).

CASEA is currently offering consults in your school. This is an opportunity to talk with members of our team about any questions or concerns you may have about your child's social and emotional wellbeing. Consultation sessions are generally for 1 hour.

CASEA can offer support and information on topics such as:

- Ways to respond to children's emotions
- What children need to develop socially and emotionally, along with ways to meet these needs
- Calming/regulation strategies
- Parenting styles & strategies
- Referral pathways to access further support
